LWDD BOARD APPROVES FISCAL YEAR 2015 BUDGET

Budget reflects investment in flood control technology and infrastructure enhancements

Delray Beach, FL – On September 17, the Lake Worth Drainage District Board of Supervisors unanimously adopted its Fiscal Year 2015 budget. The \$14.5 million budget reflects a continued commitment to operate and maintain the District's flood control system, as well as an increased investment in infrastructure improvements, including technology upgrades to enhance real-time water control operations.

The annual budget includes an assessment increase from \$42.00 to \$45.00. The assessment increase will be dedicated to capital improvements and rehabilitation of the District's flood control infrastructure which includes more than 500 miles of canal and 20 major water control structures.

This year, the District will also invest significant resources to develop and implement a telemetry system and automate the operation of 10 major water control structures. This enhanced technology will transmit real-time data and allow water managers remote access to make immediate water supply and flood control decisions.

"This budget demonstrates the Board's ongoing commitment to protecting our flood control infrastructure while enhancing the level of service to our constituents," said Board President Harry Raucher.

The budget also reflects key priorities for the board including:

- Focusing resources on flood control operations and maintenance
- Realizing efficiencies through technology upgrades and enhancements
- Leasing equipment and managing fleet to reduce maintenance costs
- Stabilizing and maintaining administrative expenses in light of increased fuel and healthcare costs

The District's annual budget is supported by an annual non-ad valorem tax which is assessed per acre or a portion thereof to landowners within the agency's jurisdictional boundaries.
